**Sudden Death of the Man who Drew the Crosby Opera House.**

On Saturday afternoon a pleasure party arrived at the Burnett House from Portsmouth, Ohio. They were bound for New-York, and among their number was Mr. A. H. LEE, of Prairie de Rocher, Ill. Mr. LEE retired to his room at quite an early hour on Thursday evening, and on being called yesterday morning complained of feeling sick. He continued to grow worse, and a physician was sent for, who did everything in his power to alleviate the sufferings of the sick man, but all without avail. Mr. LEE died about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. His disease was ascertained to be that of dropsy of the heart. He was about 51 years of age, and resided at Prairie de Rocher, Ill., where his body will be sent for interment.

Mr. LEE held the ticket which drew the Crosby Opera House at the lottery which took place in that city some two years ago. He was at that time a farmer, living quietly at his home in Prairie de Rocher. He drew the Opera House, and having disposed of it at a large price, he has
